

A Quick Craft For You To Make

Have you ever noticed terra cotta pots with beautiful moss attached? You'll find these at upscale garden shops and florists. They're easy to make and now is the perfect time, given our cooler weather.

Use one terra cotta pot of your choice.

Combine buttermilk and moss which will encourage moss growth. The moss serves to hold the runny buttermilk in place and vary the texture as well as promote growth.

You'll need moss from your garden,

Remove as much soil as possible.

Tear moss into small pieces, removing any dead leaves, bark or pine needlesPour buttermilk into a bowl, add moss and combine. Use a brush to paint the mixture all over the pot, set aside in a shaded place until you like the look. if you want a more subtle look, use a wire brush to remove any heavy clumps of moss.

Peonies Barb Bizzarri

One of my favorite flowers are peonies. They are The peonies are coming in right now and need easy to grow, deer don't bother them and they withstand and thrive during our Chicago cold winter weather.

They do like sun (don't we all!) and good air circulation. Best planted, moved or divided in October to allow for root development before the ground freezes. One key to successful peonies is that you MUST plant each one so that the crown is just 2" below the soil level with the eyes/ sprouts pointing up. If peony crowns are planted too deeply and you didn't have blooms last Spring, dig up the root ball, work the soil and replant root ball 1/2" higher than the soil Water and mulch through the summer; the crown should settle down to soil level.

In order to improve air circulation for your peonies and avoid rain/wind damage, various support systems are sold at garden stores and online. I like my husband, Joe's, innovative idea. He simply cuts down a wire tomato cage. He used a bolt cutter, and ends up with two supports. They're not obtrusive, mine are green so they blend right in, but actually any color will soon be hidden by the peonies foliage.







Birds

While looking out my kitchen window I spotted a little bird pecking at buds on the hemlock. He had a bright crown of red and yellow. After checking my bird guide I figured it was a golden-crowned kinglet. Then, under the weeping willow I saw another little brown job (LBJ), got my binoculars out and because of the yellow markings thought it was a yellow-

rumped warbler. I needed confirmation and wa-lah! The next day, my on-line

Bird Watchers blog arrived stating "Birds to watch for now". The first two birds shown were exactly what came into my yard. Truly, good things come in small packages.

Garter Snake

The other day it was warm and sunny and a little snake slithered amongst the hydrangea bushes. I know he has a den nearby. I occasionally find skins that he sheds as he grows.



This little guy had a nest under my front steps until the chipmunks took over.

Garter snake is a common name for the generally harmless, small to mediumsized snake. There are 35 species, so they come in many different colors and patterns. It's believed the garter snake got its funny name because their stripes resemble garters men used to wear to hold up their socks.

_ A few garter snakes in

the garden can be a good thing. They eat insects and other pests, so they can control those pests that harm your plants. When not resting, these snakes prefer moist, grassy areas and are often found near water, such as streams and lakes.
