Nature Notes Kerry Perry

Ferson Creek Fen is one of our areas little natural treasures.

It's a calcareous sedge meadow with portions of wet floodplain forest along the west bank of the Fox River in St. Charles. Several rare plant species are supported by this wetland ecosystem. The preserve provides nesting habitat for several bird species and offers excellent bird watching opportunities during spring migration.

Fens are peat-forming, groundwater fed wetlands. Fens differ from bogs in that they are less acidic, have higher nutrient levels and can support a more diverse plant and animal community. It's reported that only 354 acres of high-quality fens survive in the entire State of Illinois. Nearly all are in northeastern Illinois.



Even on a blustery day in March it was pleasant to stroll down the paths and boardwalks at Ferson Creek Fen. Imagine how wonderful this fen will be this spring. Get out there and enjoy.
