

What Gardening chore do you hate: Weeding


If you could have one flower in your garden what would it be:

Cornerstone Lakes Park

Cornerstone Lakes Park features 41 acres. There is a 1.5 mile walk/jog train circling the catch and release pond. It's a beautiful wide open walking path, wetlands and a riparian environment, all regulated by the Illinois Dept of Natural Resources and the Army Corp of Engineers and DuPage County. Located 1/2 mile north of North Avenue, on Smith Road (turn right at the Walmart on North Ave and Smith Rd.)

Immediately 1/2 mile north of Cornerstone Lakes is Pratt Wayne Woods. This 3,433 acres Forest Preserve is the largest forest preserve in the county. It's home to the Brewster Creek Marsh Nature Preserve. The preserve is located on the outwash plain of the West Chicago Moraine. It's home to over 1,000 species of native plants and animals.




Wonderful things are blooming in the Kruse House Garden.

Nature Notes Kerry Perry

Toads & Frogs

While spreading mulch in my yard I came upon several toads. Their coloring makes them blend in nicely with the leaf matter. When checking my gold fish pond, I noticed a little frog. So, of course I wondered what the difference is between toads and frogs and found the following:



Frogs and toads are both amphibians. Frogs usually have moist slimy skin, while toads have dry bumpy skin. Frogs use their long powerful legs to jump and hop around. Toads actually prefer to walk rather than



hop. If they do jump/hop, they only move short distances.

Touching a frog or toad will not give you warts. But the wart like bumps behind a toad's ears can be dangerous.

These glands contain a nasty poison that irritates the mouths of some predators and often the skin of humans. So toads may not cause warts, but they can cause other nasties.

If you kiss a frog, a prince will not appear, but you might get an icky taste on your lips. In fact, it's more likely that by kissing a frog, you could make the frog sick by exposing it to bacteria or chemicals from your mouth and/or hands.
