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
News from Kruse Angie & Billie, Kruse House Coordinators

E The Kruse Museum has opened for the season with an exhibit of all items related to tea time—teapots, tea services, and everything beautiful and unusual related to tea. In the museum setting we are reminded of a time when the world wasn't so rushed, and tea time was in many households a daily occasion.

At the same time, the Kruse Garden is being groomed to better show off the blooms of the shrubs and flowers. For Memorial Day the red poppies will be open on the hill, the third year of reseeding for them, where they will

flutter in the breeze, growing among the Euphorbia. The shrub

roses are starting to bloom with some having already reached an impressive size. The ancient Rosa Glauca is ready to put out its delicate pink flowers, a beautiful contrast to the burgundy leaves, a rose that has been around since the 1600's. Pansies and Dusty Miller have survived the winter, and now are impressive clumps with violets and violas peeking out here and there, in many colors.



At least two frogs have survived the winter in the pond, and are now twice 😆 as large as last year.

The generous donations of our garden club members and the shrubs and

trees financed by our garden club are all coming 😆 into a good size and are beginning to provide the perfect background for the flowers—come and see for yourself!

Add your personal touch to your yard with a garden accent. A piece of garden art or a decorative container can create a focal point, add the finishing touch to a garden room, or just delight the eye. A decorative bench can offer a shady respite or a place to soak in the sun. At The Growing Place, we've found that rearranging garden art can be a fun and easy way to refresh your space or draw attention to a seasonal display.



Consider placing pieces with complementary colors near a plant in full bloom to add even more sparkle to its flowering display. Containers can offer an easy, colorful way to fill a hole, distract the eye, or create a dramatic effect. They can be moved out to more sun to encourage better flowering, or into more shade if plants are wilting or scorching in the summer heat. A strawberry pot filled with herbs can be ideal next to the

kitchen door for easy picking. Creative statuary can give you a subtle accent or a bold statement.

One of the loveliest ways to create an intriguing path is with stepping stones. Express your personality with a variety of patterns or even make them yourself! Plus, stepping



stones encourage us to stay on the path and off of soft soil that can be easily compacted. Consider placing stones strategically so that you can easily access your beds to weed without impacting soil.

Think about adding a vertical element to your garden room with trellises, obelisks, and pillars. When covered in perennial or annual vines, these long-lasting structures can give you some much needed height in a small space or even screen a distracting view.
