## **How To Pot your own Plants**







Once you have dug up your plant, use a knife (or the shovel blade) to cut it into pieces that are about the size of your pots. Place a piece of crumpled newspaper in the bottom



of the pot and add some dirt (enough dirt that the plant will sit fairly close to the top of the pot.) Place a clump of plant into the pot. If it is a little too large, trim it to fit.







Add a little more dirt and fill the pot around the plant—you may want to use your knife or a stick to get the dirt down around the plant. When you are finished, water the plant well.

Put some sort of label into each pot to identify the type of plant. The plant may wilt a bit at first, but usually they start looking good within a week. Make certain the plant doesn't dry out and then bring it to Pamela & Dan's yard the weekend of May 10/11.





# How To Pot Up a Seedling



Make a hole in the soil using a pencil, stick or dibble.

Push the plug up out of the tray from the bottom. If you try to pull it up by the leaves, it may be damaged.



 Place the plug into the hole you made in step 1. Keep the plug even with the top of the dirt—not underneath, not sticking out.



 Carefully press the dirt in around the plug. It should be firm, but not totally solid.
