



When Should | Water?

The most predictable thing about weather is that it's unpredictable. So we are only guessing when we say that summertime will be dry. With the drought of 2005 not far in the past, it's not a bad guess and it's probably a good idea to talk about proper watering of trees. A lot of people have sprinkler systems for their turf but these are usually not set up for the trees. Even if they are, trees require a different kind of watering then turf grass.

Before talking about how to water trees we need to talk about when and if we need to water our trees. Most trees like an inch of water a week. The weather report on T.V. will tell us how much rainfall has happened at various places throughout the Chicagoland area. The official weather statistics are measured at the airports, but no one lives at the airport! The most important figure for your trees is how much rain you got at your location. The best why to measure this is by having your own rain gauge. These are very inexpensive and can be purchased at your local nursery or garden center. Some businesses give them away as promotional items. With your own rain gauge you can tell if you received the required inch of rain and if not you know you need to do supplemental watering. The important thing to keep in mind is that water and other nutrients are taken up by the ends of the roots.

Okay, so now you know if you should water your trees. The next thing you need to know is how to water your trees. If you go to the end of the limbs and draw a line straight down to the ground this is what we call the drip line. This is a good guide to use for where the ends of the roots are(although we know the fine feeder root hairs can actually go much farther). So you run your hose out to the drip line(no sprinkler needed) and turn it on very slowly. The idea is to get the water to soak in and not down the driveway into the sewer. Don't worry about how much you need to put down, the soil will tell you. Once one area is saturated, move the hose to another area. Do this until you have covered all the area under the drip line of one tree and then move on to the next tree. It is important to only do this once a week. Unlike turf grass, where the sprinkler system might be set up to water three times a week, trees need a period for the soil to dry out.

Supplemental watering of trees is very important in times of drought. It is more critical to water your trees than your grass. Turf will usually come back after times of drought whereas a tree will not. You can replace the tree but you can't replace the years or decades it took to grow it. But don't over water because that can be harmful too.
