For the lazy gardener ... and a few lucky ones!

Master Gardener Greg Bartoshuk presented his recommendations for a full season of colorful perennials that require minimal maintenance. Greg's formula is simple: plant daffodils at the rear of your garden space for blooms from April to May; plant irises in the next row ahead to take up the bloom baton for the months of May through June; in front of irises plant daylilies to offer their myriad colors during June, July and August; and finish up the growing season beginning in August with hardy mums in the very front of the garden space.

These "hard to kill" perennials should be separated by about 24", and their arrangement will allow for the plants that are coming to their peak to hide the plants behind that are dying back. These reliable plants can be the backbone to a garden design, and additional plants can be interspersed among them to your taste.

Daffodils (Apr-May): These welcome signs of spring are not susceptible to critter injury the way tulips are. Because they thrive when leaves have not yet unfolded on most trees, they adapt well to areas generally considered too shady during the rest of the season.

Irises (May-Jun): The most important thing to remember when planting tall bearded iris is that half of the rhizome should be above ground level. Do not cover it with mulch, unlike the other perennials mentioned here. Beware of too much watering of these regal beauties. Trim them down to 3-5" in late November to mid-December, and do not compost the trimmings.

Daylilies (Jun-Aug): Daylilies offer a remarkable range of choices with about 62,000 varieties registered to date. Greg recommends a waiting period from 3-5 years

to truly see the effect of new plantings. It is wise to make a garden map showing what and when any new perennials are added. Along with irises and daffodils, daylilies should be divided every 4-7 years when you notice flower production is declining.

Hardy Mums (Aug-Nov): Mums will bring us the final show of the season if we remember to clip off any flower buds through July 1st. Add mulch before true winter cold is upon us.

Other "hard to kill" plants were given honorable mention: dwarf habit tall type fescue; true lilies as a companion plant to daylilies; hostas that have it "made in the shade;" roses that grow from their own rootstock; and cultivars produced locally.

As a master gardener, Greg has discovered several products that he recommended that night: Miracle Gro every 3-4 weeks; Magic Circle deer or rabbit repellents; Mantis Tiller; and floating row covers from Gardens Alive. To help control the iris borer, he suggests a chemical Imidacloprid (sold as Scott's Merit or Bayer Grub Control)

Although I don't believe there is such a thing as a lazy gardener – I do believe that we all benefited from learning how to set up some "old reliables" in our gardens for a succession of floral enjoyment. Oh – and the lucky ones? A raffle drawing at the end of the presentation sent twelve winners home with daylily seeds from Greg's own garden!

Slug Bait Traps

Turn an empty plastic water bottle into a home-made bait container which keeps the bait dry and out of reach of birds and puts. Cut off bottle’s neck and insert back into the open end of the bottle. Tape the two pieces together with duct tape and pour in some bait. Place it under slug-prone plants.

Last month we enjoyed Cinnamon-Raisin Bars from the kitchen of Dorothy O'Connor a recipe she found in the "Better Homes and Garden" cookbook.

Cinnamon-Raisin Bars

1/2 cup butter or margarine

1 cup brown sugar

1 1/2 cups flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 1/2 cups quick-cooking rolled oats.

Cream butter and sugar. Sift together dry ingredients; stir into creamed mixture. Add oats and 1 tablespoon water.

Mix until crumbly. Firmly pat half the mixture in greased 13x9x2 inch baking dish. Spread with Raisin Filling. Mix remaining crumbs and 1 tablespoon water; spoon over filling; pat smooth. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 35 minutes. Cool. Drizzle with Cinnamon Icing. Makes 2 1/2 dozen.

Raisin Filling: Combine 1/4 cup granulated sugar and 1 tablespoon cornstarch in saucepan. Stir in 1 cup water and 2 cups raisins. Cook over medium heat till thickened and bubbly.

Cinnamon Icing: Mix 1 cup confectioners' sugar with 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon. Stir in enough milk, about 1 tablespoon, for drizzling consistency.
